Subject: R.E (Who is a Muslim and what do they believe?) Year Group: 1 Term: Spring

Core Learning of This Unit:

Children will:

- Talk about the fact that Muslims believe in God (Allah) and follow the example of the Prophet Muhammad
- Identify some ways Muslims mark Ramadan and celebrate Eid-ul-Fitr
- Recognise that Muslims do not draw Allah or the Prophet, but use calligraphy to say what God is like Re-tell a story about the life of the Prophet Muhammad
- Recognise some objects used by Muslims and suggest why they are important
- Identify some ways Muslims mark Ramadan and celebrate Eid-ul-Fitr and how this might make them feel
- Find out about and respond with ideas to examples of cooperation between people who are different

Children will visit a mosque as their religious education trip.

Prior Learning:

They will have explored past and present events and how children don't always enjoy the same things.

They identify similarities between themselves and families, communities and traditions.



National Curriculum Statements:

- Retell and suggest meanings to some religious and moral stories, exploring and discussing sacred writings and sources of wisdom and recognising the traditions from which they come.

- Recognise some different symbols and actions which express a community's way of life, appreciating some similarities between communities.

Key Vocabulary:

- Islam - The religious faith of Muslims including belief in Allah as the only God and in Muhammad as his prophet.
- Qur'an - The holy book written in Arabic.
- Mosque - The place of worship for Muslims
- Allah - Muslims believe to be the one God.
- Imam- The person who leads prayers in a mosque.
- Prophet Muhammed - The messenger of Allah. Muslim faith is inspired by the Prophet Muhammed who is seen as the messenger of Allah.
