Subject: Art Year Group: 6 Term: Autumn

Core Learning of This Unit:

Children will use their theme of **Treasures** to create a piece of Art work inspired by Expressionism. Core learning is taken from the 'Drawing' and 'Colour' Strands of Programme of Study 2023:

Significant Artist and Key Artist Knowledge

Edvard Munch (1863 – 1944) was a Norwegian painter. His painting The Scream is one of the world's most famous masterpieces. With its vibrant and unrealistic colours, it shows a new way of creating art. He was prolific as an artist but highly troubled by mental illness during his life. Throughout his artistic career, Munch focused on scenes of death, agony, and anxiety in distorted and emotionally charged portraits, all themes and styles that would be adopted by the Expressionists. **Expressionism art** refers to the ideas in which the image of reality is distorted in order to make it expressive of the artist's inner feelings or ideas.
