We are still facing the challenge of building back after the COVID pandemic and need your support to ensure every child has good attendance.

RECEPTION

Into the Woods

Little Red Riding Hood

Our new starting point for learning in Autumn 2 is 'Into the Woods'.

Last week, we read the traditional tale 'Little Red Riding Hood' emphasising the key vocabulary and phrases within the story such as 'What big eyes you have! All the better to see you with; What big ears you have! All the better to hear you with and What big teeth you have! All the better to eat you with'.

The children have been learning how to re tell the story using small world characters, sequencing cards and costumes. We are impressed at their acting skills! The children have learnt how to create a list so that they can write a shopping list for Grandma.

In addition to this, we have been playing 'huff and puff' mathematical games using a giant clock face and created observational artwork of leaves with watercolour paints. On Friday, we enjoyed jumping over the mound of leaves in our outdoor area and collecting them in baskets so that we could create 'leaf kebabs'.

RECEPTION

The 3 Little Pigs

This week, we read the 3 Little Pigs traditional tale learning the key refrains such as 'I'll huff and puff and blow your house down' and 'not on the hairs of my chinny chin chin, I will not let you in' to re tell the story to our friends. The children particularly enjoyed re-enacting the story using props and building the story set using real straw, sticks and bricks. Throughout the week, we have created huff and puff paintings (blowing paint across the picture with a straw), huff and puff mazes and drawn story maps adding key vocabulary next to the pictures. The children were delighted to discover a tuff tray filled with shaving foam and wooden blocks so that they could build and design a strong house for the 3 little pigs. On Thursday, we created tracks with our feet inspired by the bear hunt memory walk activity.

Maths

In Maths, we are learning about direction so that we can describe the route to Grandma's house. The children particularly enjoyed programming their partner to move in different directions and creating chalk paths showing Little Red Riding Hood which way to go. We have also learnt how to instruct the 'bee bots' to travel in different directions. This certainly helped us navigate directions in our bear hunt. This week, we have learnt all about the number 6 including different ways to represent it!

Diwali and Remembrance Day

The children have been learning about the festival 'Diwali'. They enjoyed creating rangoli patterns using colourful small beads, buttons and tea lights as well as copying complex designs using numicon pieces. What fabulous ideas and creativity! RECEPTION

Action Words

This week, we have introduced Action Words to the children. These are 'red' words that the children should recognise on sight. We have sent home a pink Action Word book in a plastic reading folder for home learning. Please read the additional information contained within these books to support your child to read these words. We have included an additional sheet for you to cut up and play the fun games listed. The reading folder should be returned every day in your child's book bag. I have also included a blue reading diary in your child's reading folder and a blending book suitable for their assessed reading level. Please write a comment and sign to indicate when your child has completed their reading at home aiming for 5 times a week to build fluency. Books will be changed once a week, as appropriate, usually on Thursdays.

Home Learning

We would like the children to learn the 1.1 Action Words by playing the games listed in the pink Action Word book. Please refer to the additional information contained on the Action Word sheet provided. We would also like the children to read the 'sound blending book' aiming for 5 times a week.

YEAR

We have had a busy couple of weeks in Year 1 settling back into the school routine. As I mentioned at Library time on Wednesday, we are really impressed by the children's efforts to be 1% better already this half term and how well they have immersed themselves in learning since the break!

In **English**, we have almost completed our first published story book 'The Castle Dragon' – for this we have invented and planned the characters, setting, problem and solution. We are extremely excited to share these with Reception class soon!

We have been learning all about parts and wholes in **Maths**, using this knowledge to create accurate addition number sentences. We have been finding out about how we can swap the parts around to create another number sentence too!



In **Geography** we have been using different information sources so that we can find out more about our capital city: London. We have identified some of the main landmarks in London and created a poster with these on.

We enjoyed a beautiful Autumn walk in Science last week to explore our understanding of Autumn as part of our Seasons unit. To relax, we have also been spending time reading for pleasure and having our mindful minutes listening to music.

YEAR 2

Wow! What a brilliant start to the second half term! Year 2 have returned to school with an abundance of effort to strive to be the best! It has been so impressive to see the effort and care they are demonstrating in their learning.

In **English**, we have completed our own story inspired by our core text 'Town is by the sea'. We are so excited to publish these and share them with you. We have redrafted and up-levelled our writing to include our best vocabulary and reflect on the impact on the reader.

In **Maths**, we have started our new unit, Addition and Subtraction. We have applied our place value skills of tens and ones to help us to add multiples of ten. In Geography, we have reviewed our map skills and identified if features of our maps were physical or human features. We challenged our thinking when discussing the National Coal Mining Museum as we realised it has both human and physical elements.

In P.E, our focus this half term is gymnastics. We have loves travelling at different levels and using our bodies to make different shapes.

On Wednesday afternoon, we went on a magical memory bear hunt! Our repeated read 'Grandad's Camper' has helped us to reflect on what we can do when we miss someone.

YEAR 3

What a busy yet brilliant two weeks we have had to start our half term! Our highlight so far has definitely been our school trip to Experience Barnsley Museum to explore more about the Stone Age to the Iron Age. The children were in awe of the range of artefacts on display and their enthusiasm and inquisitiveness shone throughout the whole of the day!

In **English**, we have taken great pride when editing and then publishing our biographies on the life of Mary Anning. We have now moved onto exploring our brand-new core text of 'Stone Age Boy' and over the coming weeks will be building up our knowledge of features for a diary entry.

In **Maths**, we have focussed on different strategies to help us check our calculations such as estimating and using inverse operations. This now means that we have completed our topic on addition and subtraction and will be moving onto multiplication and division. For **RE**, we explored how Hindus pray both in the Mandir and at home. We identified some of the key symbols and objects used during their worship (known as Puja) and discussed some of the similarities and difference between Hindu prayer, Islamic prayer and Christian prayer.

YEAR 4

Year 4 have had a great couple of weeks starting the term eager to learn and ready for the challenge that the term brings. I have been very impressed with the mature attitudes and enthusiasm in our lessons.

In PE, the focus is on gymnastics. This week we focused on creating balances and how we can travel in between the balances. The children showed great team work during this session!

In **English**, we have just started our new core text 'Beowulf' this has inspired the children already and we are eager to learn how we are going to use this text this half term.

In meths, we have been exploring Area. The children have shown good understanding of the unit of learning and have learnt about it in a variety of ways. They have used post it notes to show different rectilinear shapes and also drawn their own shapes to compare area.

We also enjoyed the 'Bear Hunt' this week in memory of Rai-Leyah. The children were respectful and reflective when we got to each base to identify each style of bear and thoroughly enjoyed acting out the story of 'We are going on a bear hunt'.

YEAR 5

We have had a fantastic couple of weeks in Year 5, all of the children returned from half term eager to continue their learning. Year 5 have impressed us across the curriculum, linking their learning to real-life experiences.

In **English**, we have written brilliant, captivating stories set during WW2. They thought carefully about the structure of their writing. They presented their stories clearly using an opening, build-up, dilemma, resolution and ending. The children shone with pride as they completed their stories. This week, we have finished reading our core text, 'Letters to the Lighthouse' and have begun the moving story of 'Emergency Zoo'.

In Maths, we have begun our learning of fractions – a unit of work which is challenging the children and enhancing their love of problem solving. We are able to add and subtract fractions with the same denominators, find equivalent fractions and convert improper fractions to mixed numbers. Next week, we will be applying this knowledge to reasoning questions. This half term, in **Computing**, Year 5 will be learning about the importance of encrypted messages and will understand why they are used. This week we enjoyed learning the Semaphore alphabet and used this to crack the secret code.

In **Geography**, we have been focussing on the different capital cities around the world, and this week Year 5 demonstrated their progress with this learning. We have also researched the Allied and Axis powers in World War 2. We used an atlas to help us identify where each country belongs on the map and we created our own map to present our learning.

Wednesday 13th December Outdoor Learning Day



We are so proud of all of our Junior Leadership Team and how well they represented themselves and Jerry Clay Academy at our Open Morning. They spoke with passion for learning, were polite and courteous and were confident in their speaking and listening skills. We would also like to thank them for their superb job in leading classes during our We Are Going On a Bear Hunt adventure.

In **English**, Year 6 have been learning about writing newspaper articles and will write these to report on key events in Ancient Egypt. In Maths, Year 6 have worked hard to further their learning about fractions. They have simplified, converted and are now beginning to add and subtract a range of fractions. In **Geography**, we have been learning about rivers and have started to learn the names for different parts and started to locate rivers across the UK. We have also been very mature when engaging in class discussions about screen time and sharing on social media, as part of our PSHE lessons which have linked to anti- bullying.
