Thank you for your commitment to ensuring your child attends school every day. As a result, our attendance remains in the target zone. However, I am receiving quite a few ad-hoc requests for days off and holidays in term time. Please can we ask that this is avoided. Days off disrupt learning more than you can believe. We are still facing the challenge of building back after the COVID pandemic and need your support to ensure every child has good attendance.





On World Book Day, we read 'The Foggy, Foggy Forest' book and created silhouettes and shadows using torch light to replicate the pages in the book. In the afternoon, the children gathered together to write a twisted fairy tale about 'Emerald the Witch' using the imagery and key objects as reference points.

Maths

In Maths, we are learning how to add two groups of objects together to find the total so that Mr Grinling can count how many people are visiting the lighthouse for lunch. We used the 'counting on' method as well as practising addition with concrete resources. The children particularly enjoyed playing the boat game in the playground to add and find the total.

Literacy

In Literacy, the children have enjoyed drawing and labelling pictures of The Lighthouse Keepers Lunch story, playing with language and writing messages to send in the basket to Mr and Mrs Grinling. A brilliant week!

KEY DATES

Monday 18th and Wednesday 20th March - Parents Evenings



Year 1 have had another lovely fortnight of learning across the curriculum. This culminated in our wonderful World Book Day celebrations yesterday. The children had so much fun sharing their costumes and books with one another! As a class, we were then democratic in voting for the characters, settings, and main plot ideas we wanted to be part of our class fairytale; whilst also incorporating the objects we were gifted in assembly. This resulted in our twisted tale: The Magic Necklace. The children worked hard to practise this orally and recorded this on a story map too!

In **Maths**, we have been getting super speedy with our number bonds to 20 and doubles. We have used our prior knowledge of number bonds to 10 and counting in 2s to support us to spot patterns when learning these.

In **Science**, following on from our understanding of Seasons and temperature, we have created an investigation to test the question: How much does it rain in Spring? We made some predictions and then set up some rain-catchers in our outdoor area to help us study the rainfall.

We have also been studying existing robot designs. In **English**, this has supported us to label key information for a reader of a non-fiction text. In **Design and Technology**, we discussed what we liked and would improve in these robots to help inspire us with our own robot designs for our upcoming woodwork project.



This half term, in English, we have loved creating our own African stories inspired by our core text 'Pretty Salma'. We have strived to redraft and up level our writing and reflect on the purpose and audience of our writing. We are looking forward to publishing and sharing them with you!

In Maths, we have continued to explore our unit of multiplication and division. We have used different methods and manipulatives to represent our working, while applying our understanding to two-step problems. With Mrs Longley, we have been applying our place value and addition and subtraction skills to learn about money.

Our **Art** project has been one of our favourite parts of our learning this half term! This week, we have practiced our cutting skills to create and layer shapes and patterns for our African masks. We critiqued our skills to reflect on our final design.

In **PE**, we have loved our yoga sessions to remind us of being present and mindful. These strategies are so beneficial for grounding us and promoting of mental health and wellbeing. We have also been practicing our controlling a ball using a tennis racket and ball

What a fantastic way to finish the week celebrating World Book Day! We had such a special day celebrating the magic of reading, our favourite stories and characters. During the day, we explored fairytales with a twist and created our own story combining our unique, creative ideas with the structure of Goldilocks and the three bears.



What a busy but brilliant two weeks we have had in Year 3!
Last week we had our Outdoor Learning Day focussed on our
History theme of the Vikings. The children retrieved some
fantastic knowledge they had already learnt to share with Adam
and Kay and especially enjoyed creating a real-life Viking
longship. Once this was completed, they took part in a
celebration where they paraded around the playground and
burned the ship to with the treasures they needed in the afterlife.

World Book Day is also something the children all thoroughly enjoyed! Celebrating their love for books and getting creative by working as a class to create their very own twisted fairy tale. Ours focussed upon Jack and the Beanstalk and we decided to do it in the form of a poem.

For **Maths**, we have completed our unit on fractions using fraction walls to identify a range of equivalent fractions. We have been retrieving prior learning from Year 2 to help us with our new unit on Mass and Capacity.

In **RE**, we have looked at how Jewish people celebrate Shabbat each week and compared it to other events that we already know of. We created a story board to show what happens during Shabbat, including some of the key objects used, and the importance of this for Jews.





What a brilliant couple of weeks we have had in Year 4! The children have shown great perseverance with their learning and we have seen amazing progress in our learning outcomes.

In **Maths**, the children have begun our unit of Fractions. We have worked on converting mixed number to improper fractions and the resilience with this has been fantastic to see.



In **English**, the children have started to write their own version of 'The Explorer' using different characters and alternative endings. They have blown me away with their brilliant vocabulary and exciting story telling. They are eager to hot write next week!

We were very fortunate to go and visit a Gurdwara last week in Leeds as part of our Sikhism unit in RE. The children showed great respect and enthusiasm for the religion as they were taught how Sikhs prayed, the activities that they do at the Gurdwara and were even lucky enough to try some food which they kindly brought us. It was brilliant to hear our children's knowledge being applied. This was a fantastic trip which the children enjoyed so much!

We have had a brilliant World Book Day this week, the children worked so hard to create their own twisted tale using the mysterious objects we were given in assembly. We acted out different freeze frames to represent different parts of the story and then wrote about each image. We ended the day in drama looking a twisted version of Cinderella which the children loved.

YEAR 5

Year 5 have had a fantastic fortnight and have been bursting with enthusiasm.

In **English**, Year 5 have studied the features of a traditional tale while carefully considering how to add emotion and complex sentences to our writing. Moving forward, we will be recreating our own traditional tale, inspired by 'The Lime Tree's Curse' (a chapter from our beloved core text).


In Maths, we have been working hard to understand how to find equivalents between percentages, fractions and decimals. Next week, we will explore how to compare and order these.

In RE, we are focusing on 'What it Means to be Hindu in Britain Today'. We had a fantastic, insightful visit to a Hindu temple. Year 5's curiosity shone as they asked lots of in-depth questions. We were also very fortunate to have the opportunity to watch an official service.

In **History**, Year 5 carried out a research project on Emperor Claudius. They all worked supersensibly as partners and used technology to aid their search. The children found accurate information, put the facts into their own words and wrote a paragraph explaining Emperor Claudius's impact on Britain.

Year 5 had a wonderful day celebrating

World Book Day. We enjoyed diving into our mystery box of items and were truly inspired to write a twisted tale. The classroom was full of fantastic ideas and every child created a brilliant story. We also spent precious time reading our favourite books.





Year 6 have had a fortnight full of excellent learning. In Maths, we have been learning about metric and imperial measurements and solving worded problems relating to these. In reading, we have been working on our reading stamina and different question types. We are also thoroughly enjoying our two class books, 'Wonder' by R J Palacio and 'Coming to England' by Floella Benjamin.

Earlier this week, we enjoyed a very informative visit to Mirfield Community of Resurrection where we learnt all about the monks' lives and the history of the monastery. We were very fortunate to experience a 10 minute service and how the monks sing in church. We also toured the monastery and its grounds, including the enormous library and the outdoor theatre.

In **History**, we have been learning about the presence of people from the Caribbean in WW2 and about the HMT Windrush. We presented this information using our speaking and listening skills to relay facts. We have also been reading 'Granny came here on the Empire Windrush' by Patrice Lawrence.

In Art, we have produced and critiqued our final Cubist self – portraits in Art.
