

Year 1 have loved exploring **robots** in so many different ways, designing, making, drawing, constructing and describing! We are working towards writing descriptions of our robots for a Year 1 robot magazine in English!

In **Design and Technology**, we have explored using some of the woodwork tools such as hammers and screwdrivers, which will help us to make a robot at the woodwork table. We have also designed the robots that we want to make!

During **PE**, we have working with our partners to explore moving from low to high using sequenced movements; we have added back-to-back elements into this as well as either robotic or bluebird style touches.

Our **Geography** learning has been about coasts this half term, we have enjoyed locating coasts and investigating the features of a coastal town. We have sorted the features of Scarborough into physical features and human features!



We are continuing to drive our learning even further in Year 2, especially our presentation across each subject!

For our Maths learning, we have completed our learning on multiplication and division. We explored how to represent odd and even numbers through the concrete, pictorial and abstract process so that we could use mathematical vocabulary to explain odd and even numbers.

In **English**, we have been critiquing, redrafting and publishing our instructions. We have loved creating these and adding adverbs and time adverbials to include detail.

In **RE**, we have been completing our end of unit assessment on Christianity. We have reflected on our learning so far this spring and been striving to include key words from each lesson for our essay.

In Science, we have applied our knowledge of materials to conduct our own investigation. We considered all the factors that could affect the validity and how to keep it a fair test. Using our existing knowledge, we made scientific predictions on which material would make the strongest bridge.

We have also loved practicing our tennis skills in **PE**. Focussing on how we hold the racket and our accuracy when hitting the ball across the net.

YEAR 3

Year 3 have continued to make significant progress this Spring term on our theme of 'What is Community?' There has been a variety of brilliant outcomes for each lesson that all children should be proud of!

We had a brilliant turn out for our parent workshop last week. It was a great chance for our children to show off the progress they have made with their writing. They enjoyed making Viking long ships, writing a character description for Hiccup and creating their own Viking guiz.

In **English**, they have created some phenomenal adventure stories inspired by 'How to Train Your Dragon.' Every child has taken such pride and care with their work and been eager to share the next part of their story with myself and their peers. They have really challenged themselves to use ambitious vocabulary and a range of sentence structure to have a desired effect on the reader. We cannot wait to share these with you!

For **Maths**, the children have been using their prior learning on number lines to help them read different scales. They have also used their knowledge of 1kg = 1000g to find equivalent masses, compare masses and be able to accurately add and subtract these.

In **Geography**, the children learnt about place names and where these first originated from and which settlers may have been responsible for these. They used atlases to locate different towns and cities that fit into these rules as well as observing any patterns.





Thank you to all that attended the **parent** workshop. The children were so pleased to share their work and complete activities all about the rainforest.

In **DT**, we have loved starting our new unit where we are creating our own marble runs. The children have enjoyed evaluating and trialling different existing products to see what they would incorporate into their own.

YEAR 5

Year 5 have had a brilliant couple of weeks and they have impressed us with their determination throughout the school day. This includes their diamond dash, daily dash and their efforts in creating fantastic pieces of writing.


We are currently editing and improving our traditional tales, inspired by the tale 'The Lime Tree's Curse', which is in our core text, 'The Girl who Speaks Bear'. The children have been working hard to create a descriptive opening paragraph that hooks the reader and uses similes, metaphors, and complex sentences to make their writing exciting. We can not wait to share our final pieces with you.

In **Maths**, we have completed our unit on fractions. Year 5 can multiply a fraction by a whole number, calculate a fraction of an amount, and use fractions to find the whole. Moving forward, we will focus on decimals and percentages.

In **History**, we have been exploring the life of the Romans. We have learnt about the Roman invasions, Boudicca and her rebellion and what life was like at Hadiran's Wall.

Year 5 have amazed us with their tennis skills. We have learnt how to grip the racquet using aim and power to send the ball in different directions. We can hold a rally with our partners and have begun using the scoring system to enable us to have a competitive match.

In Maths, we have been learning about Geometry, including angles, coordinates, translations and reflections. In reading, we have been working on our reading stamina and different question types.

Earlier this week, we enjoyed a very informative visit to **Mirfield Community of Resurrection** where we learnt all about the monks' lives and the history of the monastery. We were very fortunate to experience a 10 minute service and how the monks sing in church. We also toured the monastery and its grounds, including the outdoor theatre and thought maze.

We also enjoyed an Outdoor Learning
Afternoon where we learnt all about tsunamis and
earthquakes and used natural resources to replicate
these and the after effects.

In **History**, we have been learning about the experiences of people on the HMT Windrush during their travels and when they arrived. We analysed historical sources as evidence to help us back up our explanations.


In Art, we have been drawing Cubist self – portraits based on the work of Pablo Picasso.

The Pupil Premium is extra government money which is paid to schools to support children's learning and development. We can support you in finding out if your child could receive the extra money. We can choose how to best spend the Pupil Premium money and will work with you to make sure your child benefits from the extra funding.

Who could benefit from this money?

Children from the reception year to year 6 may be eligible if they:

- are registered for Free School Meals (FSM)
- have been registered for FSM at any point in the last 6 years
- are or have been in care
- have parents in the armed forces *If your child could claim for FSM but takes a packed lunch to school, it's still important you tell us. This will let us know if your child is able to receive the Pupil Premium.

Your child could benefit from:

- exciting new learning activities and experiences
- one to one or small group sessions
- extra tools, materials and equipment to help with learning in school or at home
- before/after school clubs or activities

Why should I register my child for Free School Meals (FSM)?

Children who are registered for Free School Meals (FSM) are entitled to the Pupil Premium. Your child isn't automatically registered for FSM, even though all infant children are entitled to receive a free school meal.
