
# A brilliant week of learning!


In **Science**, we have been learning about different types of animals, including humans.

In Maths, we've wrapped up our topic on time, where we focused on understanding duration and converting between minutes and seconds. We've now revisited our learning on shape from Year 2, placing particular emphasis on turns and angles. A highlight was our active lesson where we followed movement instructions to reinforce our understanding of quarter, half, and full turns—learning through movement really brought this topic to life!

In **English**, we've been exploring character descriptions through the mischievous character of Fantastic Mr Fox. After drafting our descriptions, we peer-assessed each other's work offering specific suggestions for improvement. We then published our final versions as eye-catching "wanted" posters!

In **Science**, we investigated the fascinating world of seed dispersal, using our findings to design informative and visually engaging posters.

The Pupil Premium is extra government money which is paid to schools to support children's learning and development. We can support you in finding out if your child could receive the extra money. We can choose how to best spend the Pupil Premium money and will work with you to make sure your child benefits from the extra funding.

#### Who could benefit from this money?

Children from the reception year to year 6 may be eligible if they:

- are registered for Free School Meals (FSM)
- have been registered for FSM at any point in the last 6 years
- are or have been in care
- have parents in the armed forces \*If your child could claim for FSM but takes a packed lunch to school, it's still important you tell us. This will let us know if your child is able to receive the Pupil Premium.

Your child could benefit from:

- exciting new learning activities and experiences
- one to one or small group sessions
- extra tools, materials and equipment to help with learning in school or at home
- before/after school clubs or activities

# Why should I register my child for Free School Meals (FSM)?

Children who are registered for Free School Meals (FSM) are entitled to the Pupil Premium. Your child isn't automatically registered for FSM, even though all infant children are entitled to receive a free school meal.
